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For a long time, I chased job titles and stature, thinking that once I reached a certain level, the “why” behind my leadership would magically appear.

I’m a mum of five. I lead with a big heart and have always cared deeply about people, but it took time to realise that leadership isn’t about where you sit on the org chart. It’s about what you’re willing to give so others can rise.



In 2023, I completed The Signature Program with 36 senior leaders, working across the six pillars focused on making Western Australia better. Somewhere in those conversations, it clicked. All the years I'd spent climbing were really preparing me for what came next. It stopped being about my next step up and became about how I could give back to the next generation.

For me, "giving" in leadership means using my voice, my access and my experience to open doors others might not even know exist.

In 2024, I joined Programmed Apprenticeships and Traineeships and became a strong advocate for young people, especially women in non-traditional roles. I don't just want them to start. I want them to feel supported, backed and believed in all the way through.

Outside of work, I coach women for free in my own time because I believe if women can see it, they can believe it. In 2025, I created From Classroom to Career and was honoured to be named APAC MVP, which took me to Vietnam and Japan to share my vision on the international stage with over 50,000 people across 13 countries. That wasn't about ego. It was about proving that stories from our corner of the world about young people, opportunity and inclusion deserve to be heard globally.



I found my purpose at 42. It's never too late.

One action I'm giving in 2026 to help others gain is confidence: sharing more real stories and intentionally creating more opportunities for women and young people to step up, be seen and succeed.
